# Local Professional Named Among Top 50 Women Teachers in the Nation

Golf for Women magazine runs an annual article featuring their pick of the 50 best women teaching professionals in the country. This year's article, which ran in their March/April edition, featured two Arizona Women. We tracked down one of these women, Cindy MacNider and talked with her about

her career in golf. Cindy currently teaches at Continental Golf Club, in Scottsdale, Arizona and in the summer, at Appletree Golf Club in Yakima, Washington. She has been an LPGA teaching professional for 10 years.

Cindy learned to play golf as a child of 9 and played



regularly, including on her hometown high school golf team in Dubuque, lowa. As most children do, Cindy participated in several sports at a time throughout High School until her golf coach suggested that she devote herself to one sport, which he thought would allow her to focus on becoming excellent

at that sport. Cindy took this as discouragement and gave up golf entirely for several years, choosing to play softball instead. "I don't think he would remember it the way I do", says Cindy. "At the time, there wasn't much money budgeted for high school athletic coaches, especially for girls. I think he was actually a science teacher doubling as the girls golf coach, and I'm sure he did the best he could. In a way he did inspire me, because that experience is the reason I ultimately chose teaching over trying to make it on the tour. I want to encourage the passion people have for golf. The reward is teaching someone that will fall in love with golf and stick with it, that is sort of my niche."

Cindy earned her Bachelors degree in Business from the University of Iowa, and moved to Arizona in 1987. Cindy says she was never quite satisfied in her work life and took the summer off in 1989 to decide

# Arizona Women's Match Play Championship

The Arizona Women's Golf Association will host the 73<sup>rd</sup> Annual Arizona Women's Match Play Championship on May 20-23, 2002 at Club West Golf Course, in Phoenix. This championship, rich in tradition as the original Arizona women's amateur championship, was first held at Phoenix Country Club in 1924. In the championship match, Mrs. Lorraine McArthur, Jr., defeated Mrs. Jo Goldwater 5 & 4. Jo Goldwater, mother of Barry & Bob, was a prominent figure in the early years of the AWGA, finishing second in both the 1924 and the 1926 Championships. She was the medallist in 1924 with a score of 93, exceptional for the times. The Arizona Women's Match Play Championship has been conducted every year since 1924, (except during WWII).

Come make history with us once again at the 2002 Arizona Women's Match Play Championship as Scottsdale's Missy Farr-Kaye defends her 2001 title.

# In the Spotlight

In the spotlight this month is Kathryn Ridlehoover. Kathryn moved to Arizona from Georgia in 1971. She was a biology and general science teacher in southern Arizona from 1975 - 1986. After their children were grown, Kathryn and her husband Ted returned to Georgia in 1986 to care for their aging parents but couldn't stay away. They returned to Arizona for good in 1997. Kathryn is now retired and enjoys playing golf, as well as bridge and board games, but her secret first love is poetry. If you visit Kathryn's personal web site, you will see that she demonstrates an active and vivid imagination, one of the things we appreciate most about Kathryn.

According to Ted, she has played golf off and on most of her life. She began playing avidly at least 30 years ago and is still going strong. Kathryn is a member of the AWGA through both the Huachuca and Pueblo del Sol golf clubs in Sierra Vista, Arizona. She has held several offices for these clubs over the years. In

what to do next. During that hiatus she reacquainted herself with the game, spending hours and hours on the nearest golf course, San Marcos. Back on the golf course everyday, Cindy's passion was rekindled. It was then that she had her second experience with a high school golf coach, this one with a very different ending. One day as she was pounding balls on the practice tee, a man approached her. He had been admiring her swing and wondered if she were a professional. That man turned out to be, then golf coach from Chandler High School, Coach Chuck Jerdee. She laughed and told him no, she wasn't a pro. Coach Jerdee encouraged her to follow her passion and after only four months, Cindy was breaking par.

We asked Cindy if she considers herself a coach or a teacher. "A teacher", she said. She went on to explain that a teacher, in her opinion is someone who will focus on the swing, how to hit the ball, the rules of the game, etc. A coach is someone who is more rounded and brings in other fields such as health and nutrition. "The people I work with, mostly adult beginners or social players, are more apt to need a teacher or instructor, whereas a high school student wanting to go on to play for a college needs a coach", she said. Cindy described her biggest challenges as an LPGA Teaching Professional, "Two things, one, that people believe it will be automatic, that they will learn golf immediately. They need to accept that it takes a lot of practice and understanding. Most people do not ever become great golfers, but that's the beauty of the game, you don't have to be great to really enjoy playing the game. And two, I think the LPGA Teaching Division is one of the most under appreciated organizations there is. I have run across very few men that are reluctant to hire a woman instructor. The times I am not hired are more often because I am with the LPGA and not the PGA.

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What much of the public doesn't realize is that the LPGA Teaching Division is focused on the art of teaching. Cindy is the perfect spokes person for the LPGA Teaching Division, having been elected in January to a 2-year term as President of the Western Section of the LPGA. She is also President of the Board of Directors for the Joanne Winter Arizona Silver Belle Championship. For lessons with Cindy call 480-205-3600. She is available in Arizona from October - April.

#### FAO

#### 1. Q. Can I switch my home club with the AWGA?

A. If you are a multiple member and want to have your labels list a specific club you must print your label at that golf course. If you print your label somewhere other than a golf course at which you are a member it will default to the club that is first alphabetically.

#### 2. Q. Should I always play a provisional ball if I think my ball may be lost?

A. Yes, this is to save time so that if your ball is lost you will not have to go back to where you last played from and replay your shot. Remember, if you believe your ball is in a water hazard you may not play a provisional ball as a provisional ball is only allowed under the Rules if you think your ball may be lost outside a water hazard. (See Rule 27 in the USGA Rules of Golf.)

### **RULE TIPS**

As anyone who has spent any time trying to master the Rules of Golf knows, it's no easy task. There is no easy way to remember the Rules, but some ambitious person took the time to create the following chart, which is very helpful in knowing certain consistent truths regarding the Rules of Golf.

Hassayampa Golf Club, Prescott, Arizona

The tournament shall consist of 36 holes, the first 18 holes to be played under Rule 31, Four Ball Stroke Play (better ball of partners). The second 18 holes to be played under Rule 3, Stroke Play. The combined scores of partners will be the score for the team. Partners may have no more than a 10 stroke difference in handicap on the competition course, with each player receiving 95% of her handicap on the first day and 100 % on the second day. The champions shall be the low gross and low net scorers over the field. Flights will be determined by handicap index. The field is limited to the first 54 teams. Play will begin with a **7:30 Shotgun Start**.

Entry fee of \$125.00 per player will include green fees, cart fees, lunch, prizes and awards. Entrants must use an official entry form available in this newsletter, in the 2002 Tournament Calendar and Directory or on the AWGA web page at www.awga.org.
