THE SPOTLIGHT'S ON . . . KATHERINE OLSON

It's not often you find a person who actually "practices what she preaches" but we have a shining example of one in our own Katherine Olson. Her kind and compassionate interaction with people and her enthusiasm for giving of herself are uplifting to all who meet her. As a member of the Board, she

looks at the big picture in women's golf. "I really appreciate the AWGA and what it does for its members and I know how important our services are for the women's golf community. I learned to prioritize what I do with my time and if that means playing less golf while I am serving, then I'm happy to do it," she modestly says. At one time Katherine played in four women's leagues at the same time but now she's involved in just one on a weekly basis. Her volunteer responsibilities include her assignments on the Board as Treasurer and Volunteer Development Committee Chair, working as an AWGA Rules Official on at least six tournaments a year (she always plays in Four-Ball and Scotch), interacting with the Education and Training Committee to develop resources for classes, and acting as a Program Leader for our Ambassador Program where she works with volunteers and the course Pro to make the experience a success for participants. Besides these "regular" commitments, Katherine is always available when she is needed to help on projects or present at seminars. She is unquestionably one of the most dependable core volunteers in the ranks of the AWGA and in her words "she loves working with so many great women."

Katherine began playing in 1955 when she was the number 2 player on her high school golf team. Then life sped up as she attended the University of Minnesota to get her BA degree, got married, raised a son and held a responsible job. She took a 15 year hiatus from golf and didn't start playing again until she was 33 years old. Katherine became a member of the AWGA in 1987 when she was snowbirding in Arizona from Minnesota. It was then that she joined the women's group at Ken McDonald Golf Course while she was here in the winter months. In 1988 she retired from her position as an Intervention Counselor and continued as a part-year resident for six more years adding Dobson Ranch WGA to her weekly play. Life changed in 1994 when she and her husband moved to Arizona as permanent residents. Katherine then added San Marcos and Papago to her memberships and played golf four times a week. She certainly can be described as an "avid" golfer.

Being involved in so many women's golf groups opened

the door for Katherine to learn about the larger organization that was giving her an abundance of pleasure and had added so much meaning to her life. In 2002, Katherine was appointed to the AWGA Board of Directors. The position of Secretary was open and she was immediately selected to fill that position, which she maintained until December of 2003. She was then elected to a full term on the Board in January 2004 and served as President of the Board in 2004 and 2005. In 2006, she was named Volunteer Development Committee Chair and is still successfully leading that committee. In January of 2007, she added another responsibility when she was voted in as Treasurer of the Board.

Katherine's a natural on the course. Her golf credentials include a Dobson Ranch WGA Championship, two Flagstaff City Championships (Net) in 1996 and 1999, NAWGA Championship in 1989 and Club Champion at Ken McDonald in 2002. She also can boast of a hole-in-one when she was playing Elephant Rocks GC in Williams with three other women including Linda Dalsin who were able to celebrate with her that day.

Besides her accomplishments in the golf arena, Katherine's life is full with a variety of hobbies and interests. She plays competitive bridge in both a social group and a duplicate bridge group. One of her most prized possessions, a baby grand piano which was a special gift from her now deceased husband, is the center of much of her spare time. Katherine started playing the piano when she was just seven years old and took classical lessons for 10 years. Now, a talented pianist, she enjoys playing those soothing oldies hits from the thirties, forties and fifties. Sing-alongs with Katherine are always fun!

If you haven't had the pleasure of meeting Katherine, please look her up. Beware though -- she might ask you to complete a Volunteer Interest Form for current or future committee openings! But if you look to her as a model, you'll see that volunteering can add a great deal to your life. It has the potential to bring joy in finding new friends, satisfaction in implementing important projects and passion for being part of the dynamic environment of the AWGA.

Katherine is a first-class lady with a warm, gentle and kindhearted personality. Her positive outlook on life and her supportive nature genuinely impact everyone around her. Once you meet Katherine, you'll look forward to being around her friendly, accepting temperament over and over. Her enthusiasm for the game of golf and the AWGA is contagious and she is definitely one who leads by example. From the most responsible of positions on the Board to carrying out lesser tasks, Katherine is willing and eager to do it all. The AWGA is lucky indeed to have Katherine Olson as an outstanding leader and distinguished volunteer among its membership.

CACTUS AND PINE GOLF COURSE SUPERINTENDENTS ASSOCIATION KNOWS ABOUT THE BENEFITS OF TURF



When it comes to grass, the golf industry gets hit pretty hard with criticism because of water consumption. But in an environmental report by the Cactus and Pine Golf Course Superintendent's Association, according to Pennsylvania State University, the more grassy areas the better. Here are some facts you may not have heard.

- A turf area of 50 X 50 square feet produces enough oxygen to meet the needs of a family of four
- Turfgrass helps to control not only dust but also pollen, helping with allergy control
- Turf reduces noise by absorbing, deflecting, reflecting and refracting sounds
- Grass provides a buffer zone around buildings to help retard the spread of fires
- An acre of flourishing grass can absorb hundreds of pounds of sulfur dioxide during a year

So play golf without any feeling of guilt over water usage. The grass on golf courses, as it turns out, may be a blessing to our environment and to our bodies. RULES TIP



Q

If a ball in motion (after a stroke) is deflected by a loose impediment like a leaf on the green and subsequently falls in the hole, how is it to be played?

A

Rule 19 addresses the status of what happens when a ball in motion is deflected or stopped, and by whom or what.

Because a leaf is a loose impediment (natural object), it has the status of an outside agency in stroke play. Therefore if the player's chip shot or stroke hits the leaf and subsequently goes in the hole, it is a rub of the green and the ball is holed.

The ball must be played where it lies after it contacts the loose impediment or outside agency and in this case the ball was holed, so the player has holed out with his/her chip shot.

CONDITIONS OF COMPETITION FOR ASSOCIATION TOURNAMENTS

As you know, the AWGA conducts several tournaments each year called Association Tournaments. Sometimes the Conditions of Competition are somewhat confusing. This may help to clarify the information for you. If more entries are received within the first two weeks after the tournament opens than there are spots available, players are chosen based on the number of AWGA tournaments they entered during the past 12 months. After the close of entries, specific criteria may factor into the selection from the waiting list.

Points are awarded depending on the length of the tournament (one point for a one day tournament, two points for a two day tournament). Points are also awarded for past tournaments that a player entered but was not chosen to play. No points are awarded if a player withdraws from a tournament for any reason prior to the start. Points do not accumulate until after the tournament is played to account for last minute cancellations.

70 percent of the field will come from players with the most points, 15 percent from those who have at least one point and the remainder of the field from those who have not played in AWGA tournaments in the last 12 months. Ties will be broken using the players' current handicap index.

The entry form for the AWGA State Amateur Match Play Championship is included in this newsletter. For championship tournaments, those with the lowest handicap will be accepted first. The field will be set two weeks after the opening day of entries. So if you qualify, get your entry in quick and JOIN THE FUN!

COURSE RATERS GO TO SCHOOL

To ensure that our course rating techniques are up to the standards set by the USGA, the AWGA sends a four person team each year to the USGA West Course Rating Calibration Seminar. This year's team was comprised of four AWGA Course Rating Captains: Sherry Caldwell, Ann Chatham, Judy Fick and Judi Lorenzen. It was held at Troon Country Club on February 11th and 12th.

Women's teams from several State Associations participate in this annual event and each team is tested at the conclusion in both on-course rating and written knowledge. Our team is consistently rated in the top performers.

Congratulations to our team for completing the seminar, rating our courses with competence and skill, and returning full of enthusiasm for this year's ratings!

Equipment Check

Without getting too complicated I am confident after reading this article you will be better prepared to increase your distance and accuracy by understanding

the basics of club fitting. With all the information available to us today I am confused why so many golfers do not have golf clubs that are tailored to fit their game. Club fitting is not biased, and it makes no difference if you are a low or high handicap golfer, besides most PGA professionals will not charge a club fitting fee if you purchase the equipment from their golf shop. Properly fit golf clubs are measured in length, weight and shaft flexibility. Golf clubs that are too long or short will not allow for consistent center face contact. This equals golf balls that are struck on the heel or toe of the clubface and decreases the distance of our golf shot. In addition the length, if not measured properly will cause the club sole (very bottom of the club) to dig into the ground and force the golf ball off the intended line immediately. This tends to exaggerate your slice or hook. Next time you find yourself heading to the golf course stop by the golf shop and have the pro size up your equipment while asking for any suggestions on how to get more distance and accuracy. Remember our three keys to properly fit golf clubs that will better allow you to hit great golf shots are; length, weight and Shaft flexibility.

GET YOUR TEAM TOGETHER


So, you think you want to be a golfer? Or do you want to be the BEST golfer you can possibly be? Once you've made the decision, you need to get your team together - working together - to help you achieve your highest potential in the sport you love. To get you on the right track, surround yourself with a team of experts. Stop taking unsolicited advice from friends and golfing comrades and take the plunge to find your top three people in your golf world.

1. **Certified Golf Instructor:** An instructor will give you the foundation, fundamentals, and exact mechanics of a sound swing. You can buy a book and read up on the fundamentals, but you need a hands-on approach with a certified instructor to guide you through the many swing faults you WILL have. Find an instructor that use both 3D cameras and 2D video. These will help you notice proper sequencing and positioning of the club and body.
2. **Certified Golf Fitness Coach:** A certified golf fitness coach can screen your body to see if the swing faults are due to poor mechanics or lack of ability for the body to perform a good, solid, consistent swing. An instructor and golf student can work to achieve lower scores, but if the body cannot produce a consistent, repetitious swing, it isn't going to happen. Don't change your swing to match your body! Change your body to match a correct swing.
3. **Medical:** The medical component of the team could consist of a massage therapist or a physical therapist. This is especially important if you have had injuries that inhibit performing a swing correctly. A deep tissue massage can work wonders for the soft tissue around joints and within muscles. Have you had an injury? Get a diagnosis and finish ALL of your physical therapy appointments.

When you've made the decision that you DO want to be the best golfer you can be, do some research and find a team that works together and fits your needs. Check out www.mytpi.com for certified golf fitness instructors in your area.


GET THE WORD OUT ABOUT AWGA'S TWO NEWEST PROGRAMS
