IT'S TIME FOR THE NORTHERN DISTRICT TO SHINE!

It's time for warmer temperatures, daily sunshine and lots more golf for the women in the Northern Arizona Women's Golf Association. NAWGA, as it is known by its members, opens its season of tournaments on June 1st. And for over 600 women in 27 clubs, the good ol' summertime brings with it more opportunities for golf at different courses and getting reacquainted with other NAWGA members from around the state. With member clubs extending from the Nevada border on the west to the New Mexico border on the east, the Northern Arizona Women's GA covers hundreds of miles in Arizona area.

AWGA North was established in 1974 and became an independent district known as NAWGA in 1993. Their membership has increased significantly over the years with participation at only 300 in the early 90s to twice that many in 2007. "We're a fun bunch of women," says Gayle Maisonneuve, NAWGA president. "We always do the best we can to make women feel welcome. We encourage everyone to play." And they reinforce that philosophy by allowing all women to enter their tournaments, regardless of handicaps. When a woman with a high handicap wants to enter a NAWGA tournament, she is welcome to play. The only caveat is that her Handicap Index would be reduced to 36 making her play to a lower handicap level. However, that is not an issue for most high handicappers and they are happy to be part of the group enjoying the camaraderie of the players and the excitement of the tournament.

NAWGA is committed to keeping the costs low for their tournaments with entry fees ranging from \$55 to \$70 depending on the site. But this nominal fee includes more than green fees and cart. Players also receive breakfast and lunch for these low fees! And prizes are included for those who play well enough to win. All NAWGA tournaments are flighted and they pay at least one-third of the field. Almost every dollar collected is returned to their winning participants. Where can you get a deal like that for just \$5.00 a year in membership dues!

One of the popular attractions in NAWGA tournaments is their optional "closest to the hole" wager on all par 3 holes. Women ante up and try their best to land their tee shot in close proximity to the pin. It's fun, it's competitive, and it's another opportunity to win a prize. NAWGA also sponsors Team Play events

and contributes to Junior Golf. NAWGA leadership is always looking for ways to make the game of golf more enjoyable for its members.

NAWGA's 2007 Tournaments:

June 1st – Seniors Championship will be played at Kingman's Cerbat Cliffs Golf Course. Since the tournament is on a Friday, many of the players will be heading to Laughlin for some added fun over the weekend. This is just part of the sisterhood activities shared by this district's women. Last year's Seniors Championship held at Antelope Hills included players with ages ranging from Nancy Burke at 51 to Dorothy Boyle at 92.

July 17th – Stroke Play Championship will be played at Continental Golf Course in Flagstaff

August 27th – Partners Tournament on Monday is hosted by NAWGA's newest member club, Talking Rock, in Prescott. Kim Haddow, LPGA Teaching Pro, will be giving a golf tips clinic on Sunday evening. How's that for helping their members do their best before the tournament!

Gayle reviewed past documents to find that many were carbon typed copies of minutes, correspondence and tournament flyers. "It's hard to imagine running an organization before the introduction of computers and the internet," she says. As past Tournament Director for two years and currently filling the position as well as holding the office of President, she knows all the work that goes into planning an event. Vice President, Sarah Cox, finds the host sites for their tournaments contacting several courses each year to find just the right venues for great events. "Now we can download flyers and entry forms from the AWGA website beginning with our first event." To download an entry form, go to www.awga.org. On the list on the left side, click on Tournaments, then on District Association Tournaments, then on Northern District. To join NAWGA, you must be an AWGA member of a club in northern Arizona. Contact the representative at your club or Joey Lynne Thomas, NAWGA Treasurer, at (928) 775-3258 for membership details.

Whether you live in the northern district or just go up in the summer to get out of the heat of the Valley, you can benefit from a NAWGA membership by joining a club in northern Arizona. 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AWGA Women Want it All

For several years, the larger state men's golf associations have been using a new "check point" system to manage the pace of play for their tournaments. It has been so successful, in some cases reducing the time to play a tournament round to as low as 4 hours, that it is now being used at the national level by the USGA for their Championships. The system as it was created and is now being used at the national level requires that tournaments use a tee time start. As we all know, we women tend to do shotgun starts for most tournaments, especially those that are not Championships, so that when tournament play is over, there can be an awards banquet in which all of the players can participate. A huge part of the fun for us is the camaraderie that goes with sharing a meal with our opponents or fellow competitors after the competition.

So what's a woman to do? Settle for 5-1/2 or 6 hour rounds? Give up the awards banquet? Cut the field size? Maybe we don't have to do any of those things. Maybe we can have it all!

The Tournament and Rules Committees of the AWGA have undertaken the challenge to modify the check point of pace of play management system to be used with shotgun starts. The modified system has been used at two tournaments this year with great success, reducing the time to play by at least one hour. At the Women's State 4-Ball Championship May 7 & 8, 128 women completed 18 holes of very challenging play through the canyons along the Colorado River at Emerald Canyon Golf Course in times ranging from 4:35 to 4:45 minutes.

Congratulations to these Committee members for taking on the challenge and to the players who are showing such patience in accepting the new system. Further adjustments will be made to perfect the system, but overall we think it's an ace!

Yes, under Rule 22-2, a player may have another ball lifted if the ball interferes either physically or mentally with his play (Rule 22 Ball Assisting or Interfering with Play.)

WOMEN'S GOLF JUST KEEPS ON GROWING!

For many years a lone representative of the female gender as a PGA of America Executive Director, I often hear the remark, "Oh, you work for the men's organization." It is then my pleasure to explain that many of our 28,000 PGA professionals are women and that some of the finest female professionals in our Association are right here in my Section. However, for both the professional and amateur ranks we do need to interest more women in the game.

Why wouldn't more women get involved in golf? Women like to compete. They love being outdoors, and some of the most beautiful outdoor settings are on a golf course. They enjoy the camaraderie of the game, either for business or personal reasons. In studies gathered by the PGA of America 73 percent of women agree that golf has helped them develop new relationships and allowed them to network in their business. 54 percent of women said that golf has helped them be more assertive in the workplace and at home. It is a great way to spend time with family and friends - a way to connect. Or you can play simply for the health and wellness aspects of good exercise.

How important is it that the PGA gets women interested in the game? Just look to the future. Of all new players to the game last year, 63 percent were women. We could increase that because 42 percent of women say they don't play golf but would like to learn. Of golf's best customers, more than 2 million are women and regardless of income or ownership, women control most of the spending in a household. They are responsible for over 80 percent of the total money spent.

There is no doubt that we have made substantial strides. In a three year period when junior golf grew from 4 million to 5.5 million, the percentage of female juniors grew from 13.9 to 26.6. Eighty-two percent of all high schools now offer a competitive golf experience for girls and there has also been an increase in women's collegiate golf programs. In 1990, there were 145 golf programs - by 2006 there were over four times that number.

The PGA has developed some successful programs. A total of 476,993 women participated in Play Golf America Group Lesson Programs in 2006, a 62 percent increase over the previous year. Women's Golf Week and Take Your Daughter to the Course Week, programs both targeted to bring females into the game, experienced record years with consumer participation increases of 158 percent and 16 percent respectively. A record number of women also participated in PGA Free Lesson Month. A total of 45,673 women took free lessons in 2006, a 38 percent increase over the total number of women in 2005.

Innovative ideas are needed. Locally, the AWGA has developed the Ambassador Program, which pairs experienced women golfers with PGA Teaching Professionals to remove the intimidation factor of learning the game. Mentoring from members of the AWGA provides a comfortable environment for area women to learn the game of golf. Nationally, the PGA will launch a "Get Into Golf" program that enables PGA professionals to interact with beginning women golfers, providing an introduction to the game of golf and facility orientation that will promote networking and participation.

The AWGA website makes the statement "A Woman's Place is on the Golf Course." We, at the PGA, want to help make that ring true for as many women as possible.

Green Reading: The ability to read the correct line for a putt can be a difficult task to accomplish. To help develop such a skill, consider the following points.

1. Speed: Controlling the speed of your putt is vitally important. The quicker the ball is rolling, the less the ball will break. The optimum pace to hit a putt is one that would take the ball 15 inches past the hole. This speed ensures that the ball holds its line.

2. True Down Slope Direction: The momentum of the stroke makes the ball roll along a straight line initially (we have stated the relationship between speed and break). However, as the ball gets closer to the hole the ball begins to lose its speed. As it loses its speed the ball will start to look for and go down the true downslope of the green as gravity starts to take over. Therefore make sure you are aware of your surroundings and the directions of where the low points of the slopes on and around the greens are.

MAKING A DIFFERENCE

The AWGA is governed by an elected Executive Board of 9 members who reside in all areas of the state. In order to ensure that those elected to do the important work of directing the Association are very well versed in the purpose and operation of the AWGA, nominating procedures include looking first to the working committees of the Association to select candidates. This process begins in July. Each Committee Chair will submit recommendations to the Nominating Committee who will then select the best qualified candidates for election and present you, the members, with a ballot.

So why should YOU care? Because the long term health of women's golf in Arizona depends on it! The right people doing the right things makes all the difference. Now is the time for you to take action to help us make sure that our Executive Board continues to be made up of the best our membership has to offer.

How can YOU take action?

- Help us staff our Committees with the best.
 - Go to the AWGA website, click on AWGA Needs You/AWGA Committees
 - Print out the list of AWGA Committees and their responsibilities
 - Print out the volunteer interest form
 - Think about the membership at your club. Do you have members who you think would make wonderful additions to the governance of women's golf in Arizona? If so, give them the interest form and suggest that they might consider volunteering.
 - Think about yourself. Are you one of those women?
- If you know women who have already had successful experience on an AWGA or other State Association Committee, talk with her about stepping forward to be nominated directly to the Board of Directors.

AWGA HISTORY CLASS!

 The AWGA's first president was Laura Chalmers of Phoenix. She planned and executed the AWGA's first tournament including the pairings and scoring, which was a huge success. She was born in 1867 in Mount Pleasant, Iowa and traveled by covered wagon with her parents to Yuma. They lived in Yuma for eight years before moving to Phoenix. She died in 1953 at the age of 85.

 The AWGA's first tournament was held at the Phoenix Country Club on March 6-9, 1924. There were four flights and was played in a match play format. Lorraine McArthur won the championship 5 & 4 defeating Jo Goldwater (Barry Goldwater's mother). Their second tournament was held at Warren Country Club in Bisbee.

 In 1939, the AWGA State Tournament was actually played in Cananea, Mexico.

 The first Seniors Championship was held in October of 1963 at the North and South Courses of Sun City. The theme was "Lavender and Old Lace" which they carried out with pastel flags trimmed with black lace. Things certainly have changed since those days!

 The first Scotch Tournament was held on November 5, 1979 at Camelback Country Club. Directors were outfitted with tartan plaid sashes and a bag-piper entertained the group. It soon became one of the most popular events.
