TWO DIVISIONS - TWO CHAMPIONS - TWO GENERATIONS

Match Play Championship Hails One of the Youngest Champions in AWGA History and a Senior Division Champion with an Amazing 40 Year Record of Wins

Both of our AWGA State Amateur Match Play Champions began their love of golf at a very early age. And both have experienced the thrill of fierce competition and the joy of winning tough matches as teenagers. Kristen Schelling, Champion of the Open Division, and Lynn Zmistowski, Champion of the Senior Division, came together at different stages of their lives to share their passion for golf.



Kristen Schelling Open Division

This year's Match Play Champion, Kristen Schelling, is a 17 year old from Mesa. She'll be a senior in high school in the fall and already has set goals for her future, including a college degree and a place on the LPGA Tour. Her accomplishments at such a young age are an inspiration to all golfers and her determined spirit may be

the deciding factor in her name one day becoming commonplace in the annals of women's golf. From the JGAA to the USGA and AWGA, Kristen's list of winning tournaments is ever growing.

In February, Kristen won the JGAA Thunderbird Junior Classic, a two day stroke play event, adding another victory to her accomplishments in junior golf over the years. She has been playing in USGA tournaments since she was 12 years old. To date, she has played in four consecutive USGA Girl's Junior Championships. And this summer, Kristen will once again be attempting to qualify for it - for the fifth time. In 2005, she made it to the Round of 32 in the match play bracket. In addition, this will be her third year playing in the USGA Women's Public Links. To her credit, she advanced to the Round of 64 both previous years.

Her experience with AWGA tournaments is limited but her record is undeniably impressive. She has only played in two tournaments. Her first exposure to the AWGA was her entry in the Challenge Series at Trilogy in December of 2006. She emerged as the winner. Her second experience in an AWGA tournament was the State Amateur Match Play Championship in Flagstaff. "It was exciting just to play at Forest Highlands," Kristen said in a bubbly tone. "Match Play is always fun. It's like each hole is a new match." And again, she emerged as the winner. Two competitions - two wins.

Her first match at Forest Highlands was with Barbara Byrnes, a seasoned player in the AWGA. "Barb was winning over the first six holes, hitting really good shots," Kristen remembers. "I knew this was going to be a very tough match." And it was. But Kristen moved on to her second match with Jody Chandonnet, another skilled player. "I was ahead in the front nine," Kristen said, "but Jody gave me a good run in the back nine. I played against Meghan Bremer on the third match. That was a hard day for me but I kept grinding it out to the end." Kristen finished 1 up.

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Lynn Zmistowski Senior Division

Lynn Zmistowski, winner in the Senior Division, and Kristen Schelling share more than being the AWGA 2007 State Amateur Match Play Champions. As a 16 year old state champion in Minnesota, Lynn knows the feeling of being a skilled golfer at a young age. She began her championship career in 1961 and has amassed a long list of victories in Minnesota, Colorado and Arizona. She can boast a total of 7 holes-in-one. With a Handicap Index of 2.7 and about 800 tournaments behind her, she continues to savor the sweet success of champion status.

"But there's more to golf than winning tournaments," Lynn admits. "Sure, it's great to be successful and I'm definitely serious about golf and winning, but I also like to play competitive golf for the enjoyment of making new friends." Lynn decided to play in the Senior Division knowing that starting an 18-hole round with someone in her age group would probably result in a new friend by the time the round was completed. "Conversing as you're walking down the course, sharing stories of past golf outings, and discovering that you may have some of the same friends or that you came from the same state are some of the reasons why I love to play golf," she adds.

During this year's Match Play Championship, Lynn played her second match against Betsy Bro, a competitor from over 40 years ago. Lynn and Betsy competed in the State Junior Championship in Minnesota when they were both teenagers. Lynn was a serious golfer at the time and was focused on winning. And she did. "But this time, I looked at our match in a different way," she tells. "It was a chance for me to get reacquainted with an old friend. We talked as we walked and had plenty of time to reconnect. It was such a pleasure to play with Betsy again." Lynn's final match against Judy Miller ended in 19 holes with Lynn becoming the first AWGA Match Play Champion in the Senior Division.

"I learned to play golf in an era when having a good time, making a friend, and building lasting relationships was all part of the game," Lynn remembers. "I moved to Colorado from Minnesota in 1971 when I was in my 20s. I started being

Kristen's final match was with Tui Selvaratnam, six-time AWGA Player of the Year. "This was going to be a very tough match. I knew Tui from high school golf. I respect her as a coach so it was quite different playing against her." Kristen wasn't aware of all of Tui's credentials going into the match. And it was probably good that she wasn't. She won her last match with Tui 1 Up.

When all was said and done, emerging as the second youngest champion in AWGA Match Play History, Kristen stood out. "I did OK," she said. "I had some good shots at the right times."

Kristen's parents are a major part of her success. They not only encourage and support her but travel with her all summer to play in tournaments around the country. They are the proud parents of a budding champion and she is a loving and caring daughter who appreciates the opportunities she's been given.

Like most teenagers, Kristen enjoys spending time with her friends. "Sometimes we play golf just for fun," she says. "My boyfriend is a golfer too. He likes to think he's a better player than I am. But we both have our good days on the course," she adds with a little snicker in her voice. She also enjoys watching a variety of movies, playing poker, and of course - shopping! She also has a new black lab puppy, providing fun and entertainment for her whole family.

To sum it up in Kristen's own words, "I just love golf and want to play against the best competition there is. And I've been getting steady exposure to highly skilled players. In the end, I love to win!"

The records set by the late Heather Farr continues in AWGA standings. At 14 years old, her status as the youngest Match Play Champion has been preserved for over 20 years. But this year's Champion, Kristen Schelling, is demonstrating that our champions are getting younger and Heather Farr's record will undoubtedly be challenged one day soon. Congratulations Kristen and we hope to see you on the LPGA Tour in the future!

friendly on the course at an early age and learned the value of conversation and interaction."

As a teenager, Lynn played in the only State Junior tournament that was held. There were very few events that existed for juniors then. "Girls today play much more golf than what was available when I was a teen player," she says. "There are so many tournaments for juniors now, which give these young women the opportunity to become better golfers at an earlier age."

But more events or not, Lynn's motivation and love of the game led her to become a champion who has gained respect and recognition for her skill on the course. Here's just a partial list of her accomplishments:

Lynn and her husband met on the golf course in Florida while she was a college student there. Since then, they have developed a world renowned golf clubhouse and resort facilities architecture firm. Lynn admits they have been very lucky, "Our work is our hobby," she says. To them, work and pleasure are the same thing. Golf permeates their family; her daughter, Kim was a Class A PGA Head Professional at Legend Trail, her and son-in-law, Jeff, is currently Director of Golf at Talking Stick. Since Kim has been a stay at home mom, she has now re-established her amateur standing. Lynn also has two young grandsons who she regularly takes to executive courses. Grandma is teaching the six year old to golf and lets the younger one play in the bunkers. "I want them to love being on the course and associate the game of golf with fun."

That's been Lynn's lifelong attitude about the game she has so masterfully played. After 48 years, she still can't wait until the next round. Lynn says, "Just like Arnold Palmer, I love to play golf. When I can no longer walk the course, I'll get a pull cart. And when I can't walk with a pull cart, I'll get a riding cart. But I'll keep playing until I can't play anymore!" And those are the words of a champion, a true golf enthusiast, and a player who values the camaraderie the game of golf provides!

Congratulations, Lynn on being our first Match Play Champion in the Senior Division!

RULES TIP



Q An Opponent (match) or Fellow-Competitor (stroke) removes an obstruction which affects the other players play. What is the ruling?

A If the obstruction was movable and the player had asked him not to remove it, the opponent loses the hole, or the fellow-competitor incurs a two-stroke penalty. (Rule 1-2, Exerting Influence on the Ball): Otherwise there is no penalty.

AMATEUR TEAM WINS HEATHER FARR TROPHY MATCHES

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SHORT GAME?

I haven't met a golfer yet that wasn't interested in lowering her score. However the first place most golfers head for practice is the driving range, usually swinging for the fences before it's over. You've probably heard it a 100 times, but if you truly want to lower your scores then make sure you spend twice as much time on your short game! Chipping and putting are two areas of the game that everyone can afford to improve upon. The touring pros spend more time practicing their short games than all of their other shots combined. How many weekend golfers can say the same? Here are some things to think about next time you head out to the course!

There are two parts to a successful short game: the plan and the execution. The plan is simply defining your shot before you play it. You should determine where you plan to land the ball and how far it will roll. The plan should include landing the ball on the green whenever possible and playing the best percentage shot. The best percentage shot is usually the one that is simplest to execute. Since you are hitting the ball a shorter distance than with a full swing, you should choke up on the club, narrow your stance, and stand closer to the ball. Picture the shot you're about to play and make a practice swing to approximate the swing you'll need. The club should be swung with arms and shoulders, with some wrist break. The key to shots around the green is to "keep the arms moving".

Additionally, we are licensed to issue USGA Course and Slope Ratings so that women can enjoy the game from a variety of rated tees. AWGA women also serve on USGA Committees that help to shape women's golf and impact you as an individual golfer.

The AWGA administers the USGA Rules of Golf which includes educational seminars of the Rules of Golf; advice and interpretations of the Rules of Golf; and supplying Rules Officials for area and regional golf events.

At the club level, all AWGA clubs have access to the TMS, a tournament management system that offers an easy way to manage regular play days by setting up teams and flights, arranging pairings and starting times, producing final reports and many other detail oriented tasks.

The AWGA is closely connected to local and national golf organizations such as the Golf Industry Association, Cactus and Pine Superintendents Association, International Association of Golf Administrators, Golf 20/20, the Southwest Section PGA and the National Golf Foundation. These alliances help us to know what's going on in the golf industry and to be an advocate to represent women's issues. We are involved with the selection of inductees into the Arizona Golf Hall of Fame and submit names of women each year who have made significant contributions to the game of golf.



Legend Trail is the site chosen for our State Stroke Play Championship. This is a course that will test your ability and challenge you to the fullest.

If you're looking for a taste of the Old West, this course will capture the spirit of the Sonoran desert.

The course is carefully manicured and meanders through the Arizona desert landscape offering panoramic vistas, lush fairways and tough desert carries. Numerous diverse and unique shot-making situations prompt each player to think about their club selection and shot direction carefully before teeing off. Rolling hills can deflect even the best of shots into native areas. Water comes into play on just one hole, the 7th hole, but don't dismiss it too quickly. The lake goes along most of the left side of the fairway with desert shrubs on the right. The fairway narrows as it gets closer to the green, which is guarded by bunkers, water and desert brush.

Legend Trail has a full service pro shop with women's apparel lines that include EP Pro, Tehama, Jamie Sadock, Tommy Hilfiger and Ashworth. Their restaurant, Trails End Grill, is decorated in a Southwest flavor and offers exceptional food and beverages as well as a great place to relax after the tournament. Don't be intimidated by the course. Golf For Women magazine gave Legend Trail the "Top 100 Fairways, Women-Friendly Course Award" in 2000. It's worth the drive to play at Legend Trail Golf Club.
